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LETTER FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR

LIVING WELL, LOVING WELL

As we continue to emerge from all the upheaval of the past couple of years, our vision for the 2021-22 church year was to re-discover the way of Jesus for the "new normal." We re-imagined the church as a community marked by love not just for each other, but for our neighborhoods, workplaces, schools, and communities. As we've joined with the work God is doing in and through our ministry, we have much to celebrate and be thankful for over the last year. We've learned, grown, stretched – and at times fallen short of our goals. But through it all we've formed a new foundation for what it means to be more than just a church *in* Greater Boston, but a church *for* Greater Boston. I encourage you to spend a few minutes with this Annual Report that highlights many of those things, but let me call attention to a few that stand out for me.

THE TEACHING JOURNEY

Week by week, and series by series, we turned to the Scriptures to discover truths and practices that would help us to live and love well. I am finding great joy in working with a collaborative team of preachers bringing diversity of age, gender, and ethnicity to our preaching ministry.

Rhythm – Looking into the example of Jesus and other biblical teaching, we discovered beauty and order in everyday practices like rest and work, gathering and scattering, thinking and acting, and many more.

LOVED - Christmas means we are Seen, Chosen, Valued, Saved and Free!

Promiseland – Turning to the prophet Isaiah, we found strength for today and hope for tomorrow.

ChangeMaker – We followed Jesus day by day through the events of Holy Week – a week that changed everything in our lives and the world.

The Good and Beautiful Life – Even though we're technically into the new fiscal year, we are rounding out our teaching journey by learning from Jesus and the early church how to B.L.E.S.S the world around us.

LETTER FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR (CONTINUED)

THE GREAT RESHUFFLING

Perhaps more than any other sector of society, the Church has experienced a migration as people experience changes in how they approach life and faith. Pastorally, we're seeking to shepherd people through those transitions, and to connect with those we haven't seen or heard from in a while.

Some GC folks have found their way to new faith communities, for one reason or another. We certainly miss them and are grateful for all they brought to Grace during their time with us, but we know God is able to provide for them and us as He builds His churches.

At the same time, we are welcoming many people who found us during the pandemic, many of them through our online ministries. We're being strengthened every week by the new seekers, members, givers, and volunteers the Lord is bringing our way.

While the impact of the pandemic has lingered longer than any of us anticipated, and our campuses still aren't as full as they were on Sunday mornings, our total online and in-person numbers indicate we are still engaging over 3000 people every week.

GRACE – ANYWHERE, ANYTIME

Our Digital Ministry has extended the ministry of the church beyond our physical locations, enabling us to deliver content, provide connections, disciple believers, offer care and support, and engage spiritually curious people wherever they are, whenever they are interested. Whether it's a new viewer on YouTube, a visitor to our website filling out a connection card, or an Instagram DM, Grace Chapel is more present in more online spaces than we've ever been before. And every week our Digital Ministry team is producing a more thoughtful, more relatable, more beautiful and engaging experience.

Our vision is that our digital and physical platforms will work together to serve people, build the church, and advance the Kingdom everywhere, all the time. I encourage you to take a read through Pastor Leah Knight Breton's Digital Ministry update section of this report to learn more about the exciting facet of our ministry. We're thankful for all of those who gave above and beyond to help us launch this initiative!

THE GATHERING

What if church felt more like a conversation than a convocation? Many believers and seekers today, especially younger generations, are asking important questions about faith and church, and where they fit into their lives. The Gathering is a worship, teaching, and community experience created by emerging leaders here at Grace Chapel, and it's especially attuned to those kinds of questions. Hosted at our Wilmington Campus on the first three Sunday evenings of the month, it's an intentional investment in the future of the faith community here in Greater Boston.

GOODNESS AND BEAUTY

Throughout the past couple of years, we have been trusting God to use this disruptive season to reform and renew His Church, and Grace Chapel, in particular. While we grieve the loss of some forms and connections we were so accustomed to, I believe that God is doing some good and beautiful things here at Grace.

In terms of goodness, I think of the many new ways we are engaged with and serving our local communities, our city, and the world. Every campus now has local community groups they partner with, and collectively we are investing deeply in the holistic ministry of The Boston Project. We're also involved with and have given generously to both Afghan and Ukrainian refugee resettlement efforts. (See the Special Offerings section of this report.)

When it comes to beauty, I think of the production excellence of our online services, the visual aesthetics of our graphic arts, the musical richness of our worship music; and, above all, the multi-cultural beauty of our gathered congregations.

A GRATEFUL HEART

While I say it every year, I never take for granted the gifted, devoted staff team I get to work with, and our capable and committed elders. Throughout the pandemic, and all the upheaval of the past couple of years, these faithful servant-leaders have been a steadying, empowering, and uplifting presence in my life and work. In particular, I'm grateful for my partnership with our Executive Pastor, Mark MacDonald, whose wisdom, humor, godly character, and passion for Grace Chapel's growth and impact has been a gift to me and our church.

And after 22 years at Grace, I'm as grateful as ever for the privilege of serving a responsive, encouraging, and generous congregation that remains centered on Christ and focused on our mission – helping as many people as possible to discover life with God for the good of the world!

Dear Friends-

It has been a honor to serve this year as Chair of the Elder Board – serving you, Grace Chapel, and His Kingdom.

What a year this has been: maneuvering in and out of Covid outbreaks, opening Grace Chapel and wondering who would come, watching and contributing in a variety of ways to many world crises, trusting God to navigate us through uncharted waters, and marveling at His incredible faithfulness.

I think we would all agree that this has been quite a journey. The dictionary defines the word journey as: the act of traveling from one place to another. And I think we all agree that we are in a different place today, we are different people today, and most of us look at life differently because of the journey we have traveled together. Shared experiences make a journey more pleasant.

Fourteen people share the experience of serving as elders at Grace Chapel. You may be wondering, 'What is an elder, anyway?' They guard the doctrinal and fiscal integrity of our church and guide our ministry staff and congregation in fulfilling our mission. Elders provide pastoral care to our congregation and are an important and vital part of our prayer ministry.

Our board is made up of 12 elders plus Bryan Wilkerson and Mark MacDonald who represent the Office of the Senior Pastor. We meet approximately 21 times a year, serve on a variety of committees, develop high level strategies, policies and decisions on issues that affect the entire church body. It is a joy to serve with these very committed and capable men and women.

This year we have focused on building relationships among our board members as we pray for one another and support each other in a variety of ways. We have built a liaison relationship with members of our staff and have enjoyed getting to know them better, supporting them in ministry and personal areas. A great deal of our focus this year has been in Strategic Planning as we have looked at Grace Chapel and the years ahead with a "helicopter" view. A committee of several elders and staff have worked together to consolidate and synthesize a variety of topics and are putting together a plan to move into a very exciting future. Each Sunday night at 5:00 we meet via Zoom to pray for the needs of Grace Chapel, the world, and each of you by name. It is our joy to lift you before our Lord. A nominating committee made up of elders and lay leaders, meets throughout the year to nominate, interview, and present names to the board for leadership in a variety of positions for the upcoming year. Those names, once accepted by the board are presented to the congregation (for a vote) at the Annual Celebration. This year we have welcomed many new members into the Grace Chapel family. 
DIGITAL MINISTRY UPDATE

Grace Chapel embraced social media, YouTube, and live streaming long before the COVID-19 pandemic. But after closing our physical locations in March of 2020, we faced a new dilemma: how would a church that was forced to operate onlineonly continue to minister to people in meaningful ways? Was it even possible?

It quickly became apparent that continuing our ministry would require something new and innovative - and it had to happen quickly. It was this need for innovation that led us to form our Digital Ministry. Forced to creatively translate our worship, teaching, community-building, outreach and discipleship practices online, we saw the potential that existed to reach people in an increasingly digital-first world.

We've learned a lot over these past two years, and with the gained staff and skillset, we've been able to sustain an effective and meaningful online service each week, alongside all the usual ministry that occurs in person. We've been able to scale our reach to people in our communities, and around the world. Over the past year, for every person who is present on a Sunday morning at our in-person campuses, there are 1 to 2 people worshiping with us online.






Our mission is to lead students to discover, develop, and own their faith.

Student Ministry for Middle and High School Students helps young people grades 6-12 understand how much God loves them, and how to integrate faith into all aspects of their lives.

Through fun and meaningful experiences, students will build community as they encounter Jesus. They will have the opportunity to ask questions and stay curious as they experience faith and life together in community. Students will feel known and cared for as they develop relationships with Jesus, each other, and adults who are investing in their lives.

Through our in-person small groups for students, middle- and high-schoolers built relationships with each other and with Jesus as they explored and discussed relevant Bible topics. Some students participated in our discipleship program, which are small peer-led groups, where they grew their faith through intentional spiritual conversations.







STUDENT MINISTRY EVENTS

Students had a blast gathering together again in-person over the summer at variety of events including Color the Night, movie night, murder mystery night, and Kimball Farms. They spent time making new friends and rebuilding relationships.

"Hard to Believe" was the theme for the fall retreat. Students had fun, and experienced God as they built community through local campus events and a large all-campus gathering in Lexington. Through the story of Jonah we learned how we can't outrun God's love for us.

This winter, students from all campuses gathered at our Foxboro campus. The "Walk This Way" retreat featured a day full of worship, games, and remembering that Jesus is the example of how we are to live our lives.

CROSS CULTURAL LEARNING

The middle school students participated in the Boston Project Cross Cultural Learning Experience (CCLE), serving alongside a Grace Chapel ministry partner working in a local community in a variety of ways - including painting murals with an inspiring theme from Micah 6:8:

Do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with God.










Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. GALATIANS 6:2

In 2021 Grace Chapel launched a new initiative called *Community Engagement* with the goal of mobilizing volunteers to get outside the walls of the church to meet the physical and spiritual needs of our surrounding communities and Greater Boston. We love our communities and want to see them flourish! Over this past year, we researched the needs in our communities, identified the assets that we could contribute, and formed partnerships with established organizations in our communities.

Each Campus formed a Campus Engagement Team. We also formed two All-Campus Teams to work alongside Boston Project in Dorchester and the Emmanuel Gospel Center as they help resettle Afghan and Ukrainian families. So far almost 200 Grace Chapel volunteers have helped in a number of ways, including:

- Vaccinating immigrants
- Collecting needed items
- Setting up apartments
- Tutoring students
- Providing rides to appointments
- Opening bank accounts
- Befriending Afghan refugee
 families

- Painting bathrooms
- Teacher appreciation at a Dorchester school
- Teaching Bible clubs
- Going on prayer walks
- Sending a Cross Cultural Learning Team to work with Boston Project

To learn how to serve effectively, 100 volunteers went through a six week classed entitled "When Helping Hurts." One volunteer spoke for many when he said, **"I feel God's presence and pleasure when I** build relationships with and serve alongside these new friends!"

Local generosity, global impact.

The overwhelming financial generosity of our congregation in providing above and beyond gifts for special, global needs tangibly expressed Christ's love for some vulnerable people around the world.

In May 2021, as South Asian Indians were facing unfathomable suffering and death from COVID-19, you gave generously to help a Christian hospital in the foothill of the Himalayas convert hospital beds to increase their capacity to care for COVID patients.

Last fall and Christmas, as Afghanistan returned to Taliban control and thousands of Afghan families fled for their lives, you gave to help families resettle in Greater Boston, helped in part through the good work of our partner, Emmanuel Gospel Center. Today, 80 volunteers are involved, helping Afghan several families navigate their way into American life and culture.

This spring, the biggest special offering any one can recall resulted in an outpouring of generosity for Ukraine. Funds went for direct humanitarian relief sent into Ukraine through World Relief. We also partnered with Jesus Savior Church (led by pastor Vitalie Fedula) and Invest Credit (led by Ghena Russu) as they pivoted their ministries to show the love of Christ to Ukrainian refugees arriving in Chisinau, Moldova.

Another highlight was a successful virtual Cross-cultural learning experience (CCLE) with a team from EPIC and our partners in Guatemala, Potter's House. In February, through the miracle of Zoom technology, translation and extensive preplanning, the EPIC team was able to visit Chiquimula, Guatemala virtually. The team visited families, saw fields being planted, kids at school and experienced the warm embrace of Guatemalan believers as they love and serve the "treasures." The EPIC team raised funds as if they were planning to visit in person. But instead of using the money for plane tickets and their own travel expenses, the team was able to send the funds to Potter's House so they could build hygiene stations and develop programs through their Community Center.

Thank you Grace Chapel for the many ways you show the love of Christ and care for the needs of God's people here in New England and around the world!

FINANCIAL UPDATE

INCREDIBLY FAITHFUL DESPITE UNCERTAINTY

A year ago, we thought we would be fully emerging from the COVID-19 pandemic, and we set the giving goals and expense expectations for the FY22 around that direction. We were thinking that we would be making our way back to prepandemic levels of ministry; meaning the levels of giving that would cover a full return to our ministry. Well, as we all know, that simply isn't the way the pandemic played out and the FY22 results reflect that reality. The expectation of a 10% increase in giving over FY21, which was getting us about halfway back to prepandemic levels of giving, turned out to be just a little too optimistic. Frankly, that is the sobering part of the financial story. The more encouraging part of the story is that we landed at over 96% of our \$8.9 million giving goal which is a 7% increase over prior year. Praise be to God and with gratitude to you – the faithful and generous people of Grace.

The pandemic has certainly impacted the ministry of Grace and if FY22 represents anything it is the year of not "either/or" but the "and/both" of ministry. We cautiously started returning to live in-person services early in the fiscal year last spring while still producing and maintaining a vital and engaging online campus presence. All of which takes more resources, personnel and financial, not less. With the help of 284 new first-time givers, and 121 new recurring givers, contributions totaled almost \$8.7 million. This included gifts to support regular church ministries and staff at all six campuses, as well as the funding to support our global and regional mission partners. Oh, and it is important to note that we have not passed a single offering plate since March of 2020.

Beyond that, we are grateful to God, you the congregation, and the Grace Chapel Ministry Staff that we ended the fiscal year having met all our FY22 expenses. The staff carefully watched spending while the congregation continued to give faithfully and generously. Remarkably, the congregation also provided \$976,311 (\$487,930 of which was for the Digital Ministry Initiative) in special gifts and Benevolence Fund offerings, over and above General Fund giving, to help meet the critical needs of people in our congregation, our local neighbors, and those serving Christ around the world. (More detailed information on our special offerings and impact is in our Missions Report from Pastor Jeanette.) The faithful and generous giving of our congregation especially in these uncertain times is an incredible testimony to God's faithfulness and the faithfulness of God's people of Grace. Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name! For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations. - PSALMS 100:4-5

WHAT DOES THIS NEW FISCAL YEAR LOOK LIKE?

We are continuing to work through the impact of the pandemic, for which we are grateful, and we are encouraged by the strong giving support, especially in April – the last month of our fiscal year. However, a few very strong weeks does not make for a definitive trend. With that in mind, we remain cautiously optimistic and faithfully dependent on God continuing to provide through – you – His people of Grace. And as we continue to return to and grow our engagement – we know this will have a direct impact on growing the giving and its impact. With that in mind – we have set our giving goal at 4% above actuals from FY22. We hope and pray that we will be able to achieve more than that – but we would prefer to set a realistic goal through the ongoing challenges of this coming year. That 4% increase corresponds to a giving goal just over \$8.9 million for FY23. As we pray to achieve more than this proposed 4% increase in giving – we certainly have many potential projects and programs that we could address like some of our deferred maintenance needs and new focus on Discipleship and Serving through Grace.

We remain committed to our stewardship goals that address these budget challenges by:

- Continuing to encourage people to take steps of faith on their giving journey
- Continuing to embed faithful stewardship more meaningfully in the life of the church
- Carefully watching our expenses to keep them in line with actual giving

We are absolutely positioned for growth across the board at every one of our campuses. The Board of Elders is proposing an operations budget for FY23 based on \$8,960,071 in general fund contributions. It is our deep desire and earnest prayer that more and more people in greater Boston will *discover life with God for the good of world*. God was not surprised by the pandemic and in many ways, He has used this past year to help us think and use resources creatively and to take the next steps to be a more mobilized church. We have the opportunity before us to serve in ways we never thought we could and to reach more people than we ever could have hoped or even imagined. It is our most sincere prayer that God continues to show favor to us as a church committed and called to serve greater Boston and beyond for His Kingdom purposes and for His glory alone!

DIGITAL MINISTRY INITIATIVE

When we first started talking about an online campus in the summer of 2019, I am not sure we had any idea of magnitude of what God had in mind for us as a church. We have said many times, Digital Ministry was on our hearts and minds long before the pandemic began. The only thing we didn't have a handle on was the timeline of when this would all come together. What we thought would take years to develop ended up taking a few months, beginning in March of 2020. In true form – the congregation stepped up and committed almost \$1.2 million in gifts and gift intentions over and above regular giving to support the Digital Ministry Initiative. This is yet another example of the faithfulness and generosity of God and His people. The Digital Ministry Team has been committed from the start to improve the quality and content of the services and they have truly delivered on that goal week after week. But beyond that, we are so grateful to be able to deliver in-person services, online services, and a new level of outreach week after week. This exciting capability of hybrid ministry - effectively engaging people online AND in-person - is the new reality, and we are committed to doing it well.

I frankly feel like this is where the big "C" Church finds itself these days – we are in good company. Please know that we are delighted to be able to share our church broadly so that more and more people can find their way to Grace and ultimately into relationship with Jesus. We are seeing that through our Digital Ministry that our online campus is proving to be the new front door for people who are interested in Discovering Life with God for the Good of the World!

May that be so Lord!



ANNUAL MEETING NOTES JUNE 6, 2021

CALL TO ORDER & PRAYER – Amy Warfield opened the meeting with procedural instructions and prayer at 12:32 PM. The meeting was held in person at the Lexington campus and was also livestreamed. A recording will be available on www.grace.org by June 7. Participants can ask questions and submit questions via email or a form on the church website. Elders will assess the meeting input, finalize the motions, and post them on the website by June 11.

VOTING PROCESS – Members will receive an email with a link to an online voting ballot by June 11. If not received, please contact the church. Paper ballots will also be available at all campuses or by request by calling or emailing the church. Voting must be completed by end of day, June 20, 2021. Voting results will be posted on the website by June 23, 2021.

2020 MEETING MINUTES – Minutes from the June 7, 2020 annual meeting are included in the annual report and are available at grace.org/2021annualmeeting.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT – Pastor Bryan Wilkerson presented the Senior Pastor Report. Pastor Bryan reflected on how we have been able to continue ministry successfully and grow the church community without meeting in person since March 2020.

The Grace Chapel Vision: To be a growing community of seekers and believers discovering life with God for the good of greater Boston and the world. Discovering Life with God for the Good of the World.

The ministry focus this year was The Way of Jesus (Luke-Act). Sermon series included:

Summer 2020: God With Us? Fall/Winter 2020: Disrupted: Following Jesus Out of the Box Advent 2020: Comfort and Joy Winter 2021: Finite Disappointment/Infinite Hope Lent/Easter 2021: FastForward Spring 2021: Finding Our Way Forward

In addition, these messages spoke into current events in the world: Fall 2020: Serpents and Doves: Building Bridges in Polarized Times Global Awareness Week 2020: Building Gospel Bridges **Re-launch:** Initiatives and priorities as we relaunch after the pandemic

- Our new normal will be a hybrid church model
 - Two platforms for ministry: physical and digital/online
 - A Pastor of Digital Ministry has been added, with Leah Knight Breton in the position
 - \circ $\,$ We now have an online campus, with Scott Miller as the campus pastor
- Care and Connection: Reaching out to insure that people feel cared for and connected
- Community Engagement: Meeting the needs of people in the community
- Growth: We want to continue to grow, reach new people, discover new ministries

Pastoral Resident Program: This two-year program provides formative experiences for emerging pastoral leaders. Scott Miller was the first in the program. Two new pastoral residents are starting in the next month, one in Lexington and one in Wilmington.

Pastor Bryan expressed gratitude to the elders for their leadership, and to the staff and congregation during this time of living through a pandemic. He gave appreciation for Elder Chair Jimmy Su, who will be stepping down from the board this year.

ELDERS' REPORT - Jimmy Su presented the Elders' Report. He reflected on the past year when we had to adapt our ministry model very quickly. He thanked the digital ministry team that was able to ramp up with little notice in order to provide online services. He thanked the facilities management team, which has had to develop and implement new usage policies to comply with new legal and health guidelines. He also thanked all staff and volunteers who have helped keep the church community connected and cared for.

Recent and ongoing efforts of the board have included:

- Establishing a digital ministry committee, a combination of staff, domain experts and elders whose charge it is to develop and strengthen our digital and online ministry efforts
- Proposing bylaw updates to allow for digital annual meeting participation and voting
- Pivoting our vision and growth strategy towards a new model of integrated digital and physical, in-person efforts

The board is grateful to Pastor Bryan, executive pastor Mark McDonald, and all the staff for their strong efforts to implement church programs online since the church building closed in March 2020.

TREASURER'S REPORT – Eric Bergstrom presented the Treasurer's Report. FY21 giving was at 99.6% of budget, adjusted for the pandemic. This was 85% of FY20 actual giving. Staff watched expenses carefully and came in \$680K below budget.

In addition to general giving, the congregation gave over \$332,000 in special offerings during Global Awareness Week and Christmas Eve services, for Cedar Home Beirut, to a special COVID Fund, and to the Benevolence Fund.

ANNUAL MEETING NOTES (CONTINUED)

The FY22 proposed budget is \$8.9 million, a 10% increase in giving; this is still 7% below the FY20 giving level. To operate at pre-pandemic levels, we need to work our way back to FY20 levels of giving. Breakdown of the proposed budget: 70% to ministry and ministry support, 13% to missions, 11% to buildings, 6% to mortgage principal and interest.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT – Priscilla Seuss presented the Nominating Committee Report, identifying the nominating committee and presenting the slate of nominees for the Board of Elders, Nominating Committee, Audit Committee, Moderator and Clerk. QUESTIONS & ANSWERS – Amy Warfield moderated a time of Q & A.

- 1. How do I confirm that I am a church member: Reach out to the church office or your local campus if you are unsure.
- 2. How much of our total budget goes to staff salaries? Seventy percent of the budget goes to ministry & ministry support. Staff salaries are included in this figure. Salaries, benefits, and taxes make up 60% of the total budget.
- 3. Will there be support for missions programs or mission trips? Thirteen percent of the budget is for missions. This summer, except for a component of a Boston Project missions project, all trips will be virtual. We hope to return to in-person trips soon.
- 4. What does the "principal repayment" budget line represent? It is any outstanding loan principal payments, including mortgages and our available Line of Credit if utilized.
- 5. What staff changes have occurred in the past 12 months? While we are always sad to see a staff member leave, we are equally moved by the many ways former staff members leverage what they have learned to serve the Kingdom in new and exciting ways. As departures occurred this past year, we have been thoughtful and strategic about how and when we replaced those staff roles. The new people now serving on staff include:

a. Watertown & ELEX both hired new part-time admin's: Matt Fong & Thaiz De La Cruz, respectively

b. Lexington has several new faces – Adam Rowe was moved into the campus pastor role. Nia Green has been hired as the director for contemporary worship, Jason Cross is the director of traditional worship. We have also recently hired a new director of children's ministry, Patti Lake (Technically a FY21 hire).

c. In Central Ministries, we have moved Richard Rhodes to become the Pastor of Community Engagement. In addition, we have hired a graphic designer, Katie Delany-Graves; admin support for our NextGen ministries, Paige Finlayson; and worship teams, Genevieve Lefevre. We have also added a new HR director, Sharon Whitehead.

d. We have also established our new Digital Ministries Team, led by Leah Knight Breton, and are working to fill a few open roles on that team.
